## **Recommended Licensure Language for DPD**

While state interpretations of statutes may vary, it is ACEND's belief that ACEND-accredited Didactic Programs in Dietetics (DPD) meet the didactic portion of course requirements for dietitian or dietetics licensure and certification in all states. However, completing an ACEND-accredited bachelor's program alone is not sufficient to qualify an individual for licensure or certification as a dietitian in any state. In addition to earning a bachelor's degree and meeting other state-specified requirements, individuals must also complete a supervised practice experience and pass a licensing exam. Consistent with current requirements of the Registered Dietitian credential, some states may also require initial dietitian licensure applicants to hold a master's degree as indicated in the linked document provided by the Academy of Nutrition and Dietetics.
